#### **Dodgeball**


Year3/4 participated in a Level 2 dodge ball competi-

#### **CROSS CURRICULAR DAYS**


Pupils enjoyed a whole school cross curricular day themed around the tantalising topic of 'International Cuisine.'

The day was filled with an array of delectable foods being prepared, delicious aromas, and taster sessions tingling the taste buds!

The children learnt about Indian cuisine; and the history and origination of the many spices used in Indian cooking. The taster session was sensational where the children had

#### **OUR RIGHTS**

This term's cross the curricular

covered the particularly relevant and important topic of 'Our Rights.' The children looked at basic human rights; food, water, shelter, clothing and education and created a banner as a whole neglect and the right school project outlining the different human rights we are all entitled to. They then drew comparisons between their standards of living and that of children from less economically developed countries; whilst brainstorming ideas about how we can help to improve the lives of the less fortunate children

including raising money and making duaa for them.

Children also explored their right to 'Love, Care and Protection' and acknowledge

importance having the right to be cared for , along with the right to go to school, to be protected from abuse and to protection from exploitative work.

To further explore the right to education, children learnt about impoverished children with no access to education and the struggles of women to gain education in some parts of the world. They looked at the profile of "Malala" who is famously known for her struggle to gain education for herself and other young girls. Children enjoyed practising writing and reading their names in the Chinese language in order to empathise with the people who

are unable to read and write.

Children also learnt about rights in Islam and created a 'tree of rights' outlining the different rights of men, women, children and animals that one is required to fulfil.

Additionally, children explored Freedom of Expression using Amnesty International as their inspiration. Children read and discussed the right to free speech using key communication and critical thinking skills, with a mixture of film and informative text. Children took part in a host of campaigning activities for Johan Teterissa and Mahendra who were arrested for leading peaceful protests in



Indonesia, which cluded designing a colourful patchwork to show their solidarity.



A Learn to ride/Level 1 cycle training session was run at School for Year 6 pupils. The session consisted of: understanding of safety equipment and clothing, carrying

out simple bike checks and getting on and off the bike, starting off, pedalling and stopping without help. After that they were taught how to ride along without help, make the bike go where they want, use gears, stop quickly with control, manoeuvre safely to avoid objects, look all around, including behind, without loss of control and control the bike with one hand. Our non-riders can now ride and are prepared for L1 and L2 Bikeability.



#### **Bikeability Balance**

Our non-riders in ks1 were given the opportunity to experience two wheels with the aim of achieving balance, stimulated through games and exercises. The pupils developed motor skills, spatial awareness, balance, agility, core strength and co-ordination. It also helped to increase and maintain children's confidence as they were in con-

trol of the bike. All this....without a stabiliser in sight!

Road Safety 2 police officers came to visit

the Reception class children during road safety week. They talked about the green cross code and how to keep safe. The children listened to the different jobs the

police officers do and had the opportunity to ask questions. A big Thank you to PC Julie, and PC Adam. It was a great learning experience for the children especially since their role play area is currently a police station!!



During road safety week, Year 3 had the opportunity to work with the road safety team from Kirklees council. They learnt about the importance of using and crossing the roads safely, safe places to cross from and the Green Cross code. The road safety team brought along fun packed activities and helped the students cross the road outside school safely. Please remember to drive safely whilst outside and close to school, and ensure children are belted up!

### Out of Space

In science Year 5 have been exploring Space and beyond! They learnt how day



and night occurs by observing the orbit of the Earth. Also the children experimented the moon phases by using Oreo biscuits. An opportunity was given to the children to create their own space models at home. The children created fantastic and imaginative models; the whole school was in awe! This topic amazed the children on the wonders of Almighty's creation and makes you think about 'So which of the favours of your Lord would you deny? '

#### Tropical Rainforest

This term in Geography Year 4's explored the beautiful

Topical Rainforests. The children learnt about the location, climate and different layers of the Rainforest. They were given an opportunity to create their own rainforest model. The competition was fierce as all entries were spectacular and imaginative with great creative



skills at play! This topic highlighted the immense beauty of the almighty's creation.

Year 3's have been learning about the "Pointillism" art movement and the prominent artist named George Seurat who used this technique in his work. The children practised this technique and eventually created their own lovely piece of art.



#### Science - Habitats project

As part of Year 2's science topic - 'Living things and their habitats' the children were given a project to complete in their own time.



Their task was to create a habitat for their chosen animal. The class produced some excellent homes for their animals and should be proud of themselves!

Nursery children visited Dewsbury Library as part of their 'I love books ' topic and were thrilled to choose their own books from the shelves and going through them. They particularly enjoyed listening to the 'Hungry Caterpillar' story and



the colouring activities and were excited to bring a pack of goodies home from the library.



UREKA As part of our topic work this term, Year 2's visited Eureka-The National Children's Museum, to support their learning and to inspire them to find out about themselves and the world around them. The children thoroughly enjoyed exploring the different galleries throughout the day.



As part of Year 6's History topic 'Crime and Punishment' they visited Ripon Museum. They explored the RIPON MUSEUMS Workhouse, which provided a harsh touch of reality, gaining an insight into poverty. They found the

Prison and Courthouse museum interesting and looked at how crime was detected during the Victorian period. Visiting an old police station gave them an insight into the kind of punishments that were handed out and what it was like to be sentenced and transported thousands of miles across the oceans to a strange land where sur-



vival was not guaranteed. The children enjoyed re-enacting a court case in the building that was once used as a court house. The host was amazed at the children's excellent speaking and listening skills! Overall it was a lovely learning experience!

Quran Club Trips.....Kids had amazing time at both Maize Maze and Tree Top Nets this term. This was an opportunity for both fun and applying concepts learnt from an Islamic perspective.

As part of Year 1's Science topic Our Pets' they visited Pets at

Home to have a look at the different pets people keep. They thoroughly enjoyed looking at the fish, rabbits, gerbils and even a bearded dragon and discussed how we should look after them.



Year 4's visited Magna Museum as part of their science topic. They explored and investigated the

pavilions dedicated to each of the four natural elements water, fire, air and earth. As they walked through the dark, cold and natural corridors of Magna, the children researched different inventors and famous people in the field of science. The children thoroughly enjoyed playing in the water pavilion with their friends. It was a tiring but certainly an exciting day!



In History, Year 1's have been learning about changes within daily life

and to consolidate their learning they visited Tolson Museum in Huddersfield. Throughout the day, the children took part in various activities that reflected the past and had great fun re-enacting a school day from
