using and crossing the roads safely, safe places to cross from and the Green Cross code.




Cross curricular Days

Pupils identified and discussed different races, cultures and festivals such as Eid, Christmas, Diwali, Hanukkah, Vaisakhi, Burns Night, Chinese New Year and many more festivals and how

they are celebrated around the world. Pupils enjoyed creating their own Rangoli pattern using scratch art and using a range of 2D shapes and lines of



symmetry to create their creative and beautiful art pieces.

Children explored the different religions of the world including the importance of respect and unity. They wrote down all the words that they could think of to make the world a better place and added their own illustrations. They also wrote down in thought bubbles how one can help to unite the world and make it a better place.

Children also enjoyed learning about traditional clothing from all over the world. They looked at what the other cultures may identify as special clothing, where the different types of clothing have originated from and the history behind it. Children designed their very own Japanese kimono using pencil crayons, geometric patterns and other different designs around

them. Children thoroughly enjoyed learning and sampling the different types of from dishes

around the world. There was an assortment of foods for the children to experience and had fun tasting and discussing their likes and dislikes from the food sampled.

language, race and cultural barriers.

COP26 - (26th Conference of the Parties)

This terms cross curricular day was themed around 'COP26'; the 26th big conference where leaders from all over the world came together in Glasgow to discuss how climate change is going to be tackled and agree on actions that could help slow down climate change. Throughout the day children had various opportunities to learn about climate change, the factors that are contributing to global warming, greenhouse gases and its effect on the environment.

The children had fun learning about the effects of climate change through carrying out Greenhouse gas experiment. They learnt how the energy needed for our everyday simple routines where we use electricity, fuel, etc. produces a gas called cardioxide also known as a 'greenhouse' gas because it traps

heat, causing the Earth to warm up. The more carbon dioxide is released into the atmosphere, the worse it is for the environment.

They learnt how over the years our world has seen a huge increase in the world's population, increase in human consumption, industrialisation, urbanisation and global trade has led to the increase of gases that is causing temperatures to rise around

the world. Global warming is harming the environment in several ways and the Earth's resources being used more than what can be replenished naturally. Children enjoyed building the tallest tower comprising of different materials whilst looking at industrialisation and engineering. Children understood that everything we do has an impact on the environment and for the wellbeing and sustainability of all living things, it becomes

imperative for us to protect our earth and its environment.

Children were encouraged to look at ways of making small changes to their daily routine, where they could reduce their carbon footprint and have a positive effect on the environment.

They understood the importance of helping and looking after our environment by keeping it clean from pollution, recycling waste items, reducing energy consumption, conserving water and forestation.

Overall, it was an enjoyable and informative day where children appreciated the beauty of our planet and understood the importance of our responsibility to take care of it.

The children had an interesting afternoon asking questions and gaining a better understanding of their grandparents' childhood. Children thoroughly enjoyed listening to the tales of their grandparents and were amazed at the differences compared to their own childhood! and an extra 30 minutes of lunch. A huge Thank You to all the teachers and staff for their hard work. effort and valued contribution to our school.


Anti-Bullying Week 2021
